

What is LAMB Project?

- A population-based survey of newly delivered moms stratified by SPA and race/ethnicity from birth records
- Close to 5,500 women responded to the survey in 2005 LAMB, of which about 1075 were Asian/Pacific Islander women
- Mail survey with telephone followup administered in three languages
- Adjusted response rate was close to 50%



- Mail survey with telephone followup administered in three languages
- Adjusted response rate was close to 50%



- Adjusted response rate was close to 50%


