Laura Trejo, MSG, MPA, is the Technical and Policy Advisor to the Mayor of Los Angeles and the City Council. She is a gerontologist with a master's degree in Gerontology as well as a Master of Public Administration degree and graduate certificate in Long-Term Care Administration, all from the University of Southern California. She has consulted and trained extensively throughout the United States on the development of programs for the elderly with an emphasis on cultural competence. She has worked with individual countries and international organizations to develop policy initiatives and programs in the areas of aging, mental health, physical health, Alzheimer's disease, and rehabilitation.

Tiombe Wallace, MFT, is a licensed Marriage and Family Therapist with over 20 years of experience as a feminist therapist, educator, and activist working to empower survivors and communities. As the owner of a private practice and consulting business, Tiombe, MFT, Inc., she provides individual and group therapy for survivors, consultation on curriculum and program development, clinical supervision, anti-oppression training, and speaking engagements for social services, universities, youth programs, crisis services, and counselor/mentor certification courses. She received dual bachelors' degrees from Scripps College in Claremont in Psychology and Women's Studies and her master's in Counseling: Emphasis in Marriage and Family Therapy from California State University, Long Beach. She was the Director of Counseling Services for the Sexual Assault Crisis Agency (SACA), working in all facets of the rape crisis center for over 12 years. Prior to VyC, Ms. Lemus was active as a community consultant to local community organizations. Ms. Lemus has 21 years of management experience in the Rural Health Division of the California Department of Health Services.

Adriana Argáiz Parra, MSc, is Consul for Community Affairs at the Consulate General of Mexico in Los Angeles. She is a career diplomat and a member of the Mexican Foreign Service since 2008. Consul Argáiz is a social policy and community outreach specialist with over 15 years of experience working in the Mexican public sector, nonprofits and international organizations. She specializes in migration, remittances and development issues, with a strong background in working with community based organizations. Prior to her role at the Consulate, she served as the Economic Affairs & Press Attaché at the Embassy of Mexico in Argentina. Consul Argáiz received her Master of Science in Social Policy and Planning in Developing Countries from The London School of Economics & Political Science.

Cynthia Banks is Director of the Los Angeles County Department of Workforce Development, Aging & Community Services (WDACS). After 30 years of management positions in the County of Los Angeles, Ms. Banks joined WDACS as its Chief Deputy in 2003. In 2006, she was appointed its' Director. In this position, she oversees a multitude of services to LA County's 1 million-plus senior citizens. In addition, she administers the work of the Los Angeles County Workforce Investment Area, which offers an array of pre-employment and employment services to county residents. Ms. Banks has worked to affect a positive transformation of her department by implementing strategic approaches to customer service, technology, and contract services. In July 2009, two LA County departments were merged with WDACS: Office of Ombudsman and the Human Relations Commission. Both departments enhance the foundational community impact previously established by WDACS by bringing a wealth of proven strategies to improve the lives of LA County residents.

Viviana Criado, MPA, is the project coordinator for the Los Angeles Alliance for Community Health and Aging (LAACHA). With over 25 years of experience in the management, development and implementation of mental health and community development programs, Ms. Criado has worked both in the public and private sectors to improve the quality of mental health care for older adults. As a private consultant, she provided technical assistance to government and community-based organizations on cross-cultural issues and evidence-based program implementation. She holds a bachelor's degree in Psychology from Thomas Edison State College, and a master's degree in Public Administration from San Diego State University.

Ellen Eidem, MS, is Director of the Office of Women's Health at the LA County Department of Public Health. The Office seeks to decrease health inequities and improve the health of women in LA County working at the individual, community, and systems levels through education, advocacy, program planning and promotion, policy recommendations, and increasing access to services, especially for low-income and underserved women. Prior to 2002, Ms. Eidem served as Director of Programs and Administration for the Los Angeles Free Clinic (now Saban Community Clinic) and as the Director of Quality Improvement for the California and Los Angeles Regional Family Planning Councils (now Essential Access Health). Prior to this, Ms. Eidem was an administrator and instructor at Planned Parenthood Alameda/San Francisco and the Berkeley Women's Health Collective. **Haydeh Fakhrabadi**, PsyD, is a licensed Clinical Psychologist at the Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health. Dr. Fakhrabadi has been employed by Department of Mental Health since 2008; she joined the Older Adult System of Care Administration in January of 2011. She received her M.A. in Clinical Health Psychology in 2001 and graduated from Pepperdine University with a doctoral degree in Clinical Psychology in 2006. She works with the Older Adult Prevention and Early Intervention Programs, Anti-Stigma and Discrimination and Suicide Prevention teams to provide education to older adults, their support systems, and caregivers. She also provides mental health training to Farsi speaking older adults in the community. Dr. Fakhrabadi has been involved with Co-location and Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) housing projects.

Barbara Ferrer, PhD, MPH, MEd, is Director of the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health. She is a nationally known public health leader with over 30 years of professional experience as a philanthropic strategist, public health director, educational leader, researcher, and community advocate. Most recently, Dr. Ferrer served as the Chief Strategy Officer for the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, where she was responsible for developing the strategic direction for critical program-related work and providing leadership to the foundation's key program areas, including food, health, and well-being. Prior to that, Dr. Ferrer served as Executive Director of the Boston Public Health Commission, where she led a range of public health programs and built innovative partnerships to address inequities in health outcomes and support healthy families and communities. Dr. Ferrer also served as Director of Health Promotion & Chronic Disease Prevention and Director of the Division of Maternal & Child Health at the Massachusetts Department of Public Health. As headmaster at a district high school in Boston, she led efforts to significantly improve high school graduation rates and ensure that every graduating senior was accepted to college. Dr. Ferrer received her PhD in Social Welfare from Brandeis University, a master's in Public Health from Boston University, a master's in Education from the University of Massachusetts, Boston, and a bachelor's in Community Studies from UC Santa Cruz.

Stella Fogleman, RN, MSN, MPH, CNS, is Director of the Emergency Preparedness & Response Division (EPRD) at the LA County Department of Public Health and leads readiness activities to prepare for emerging threats and natural disasters as well as acts of biological, radiological, and chemical terrorism. EPRD encompasses several important areas, including Threat Assessment, Policy and Planning, Community Resilience, Emergency Operations, and Finance and Administration. She began her nursing career as a Pediatric Staff Nurse at Miller Children's Hospital in Long Beach, then came to LA County as a District Public Health Nurse. She was also an Assistant Program Specialist at the Toxics Epidemiology Program, where she worked with an interdisciplinary team to assess patterns of disease related to toxic agent exposures throughout LA County. Prior to her current role, Ms. Fogleman was the Director of EPRD's Community Resilience Unit, aimed at increasing community preparedness and resilience among LA County populations. She received her Master of Science in Nursing and Master's in Public Health at Cal State University, Long Beach, where she also received her certification as a Clinical Nurse Specialist in Community Health.

Martin Jones, Jr., LCSW, is Chief of the Bureau of Outpatient Services at the LA County Department of Mental Health, and a Licensed Clinical Social Worker with over 20 years of social work experience. His social work experience spans several
